Leveling the playing field, one *degree* at a time.

Nationally, it is estimated that only 21 percent of low-income, first-generation students who enter a four-year college will complete their degree. Since 1992, Wallin Education Partners has changed these odds for Minnesota students by upholding a simple but powerful truth—when you invest in education, you invest in society.

This year, we are reminded of the challenges we face as a community and society. Our education system has significant gaps, high costs and persistent disparities for low-income students, especially students of color. We can change the patterns that hold so many young people back and provide them the support needed to help them succeed. Our model of financial aid and comprehensive individual advising accelerates economic mobility and fundamentally increases the odds of graduation and employment for underrepresented students.

With access to education, so much can change. For nearly 30 years we have partnered with high schools, donors, community organizations and civic leaders to support and send more than 5,000 students on their college journeys. I believe the accomplishments of Wallin scholars speak for themselves; but don't take my word for it, read on to see for yourself...

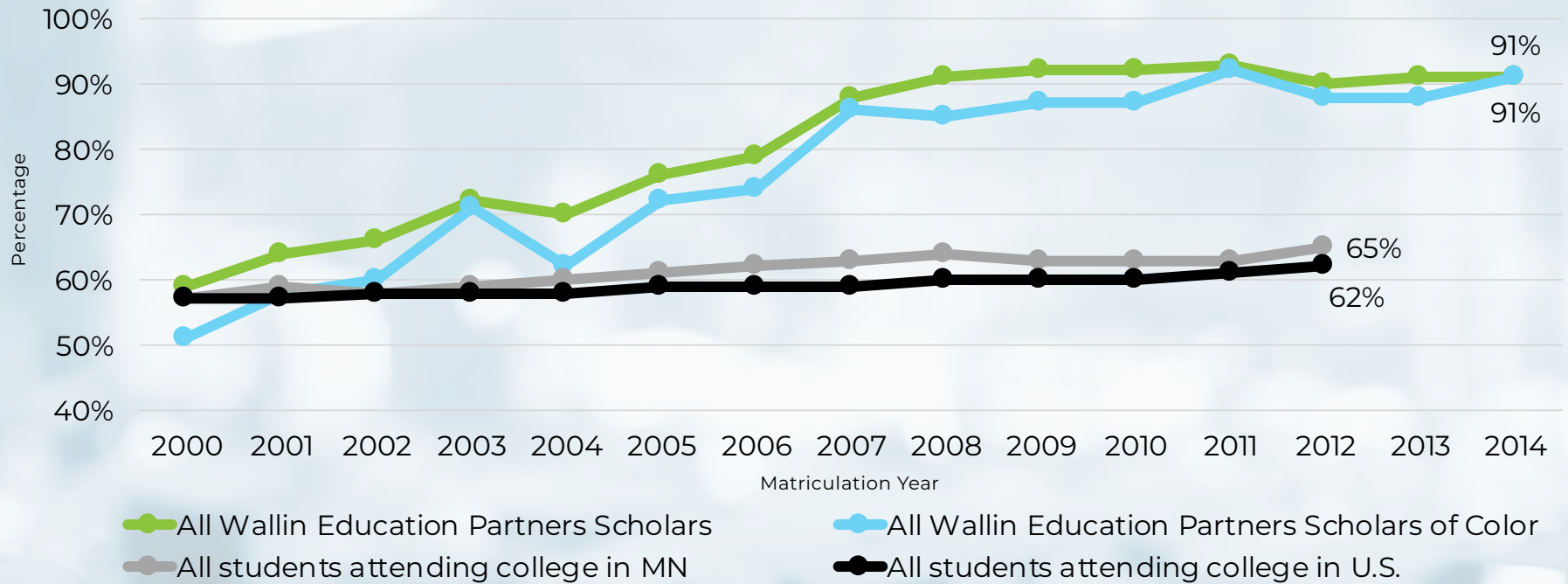

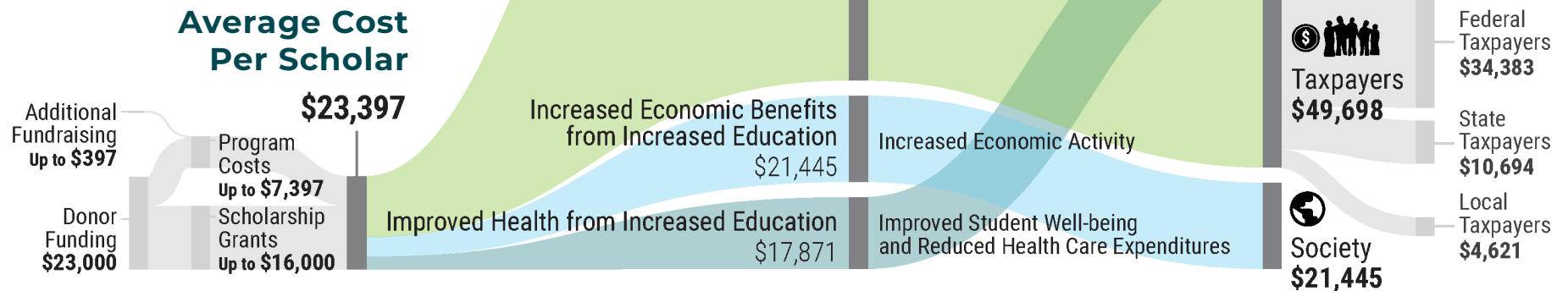

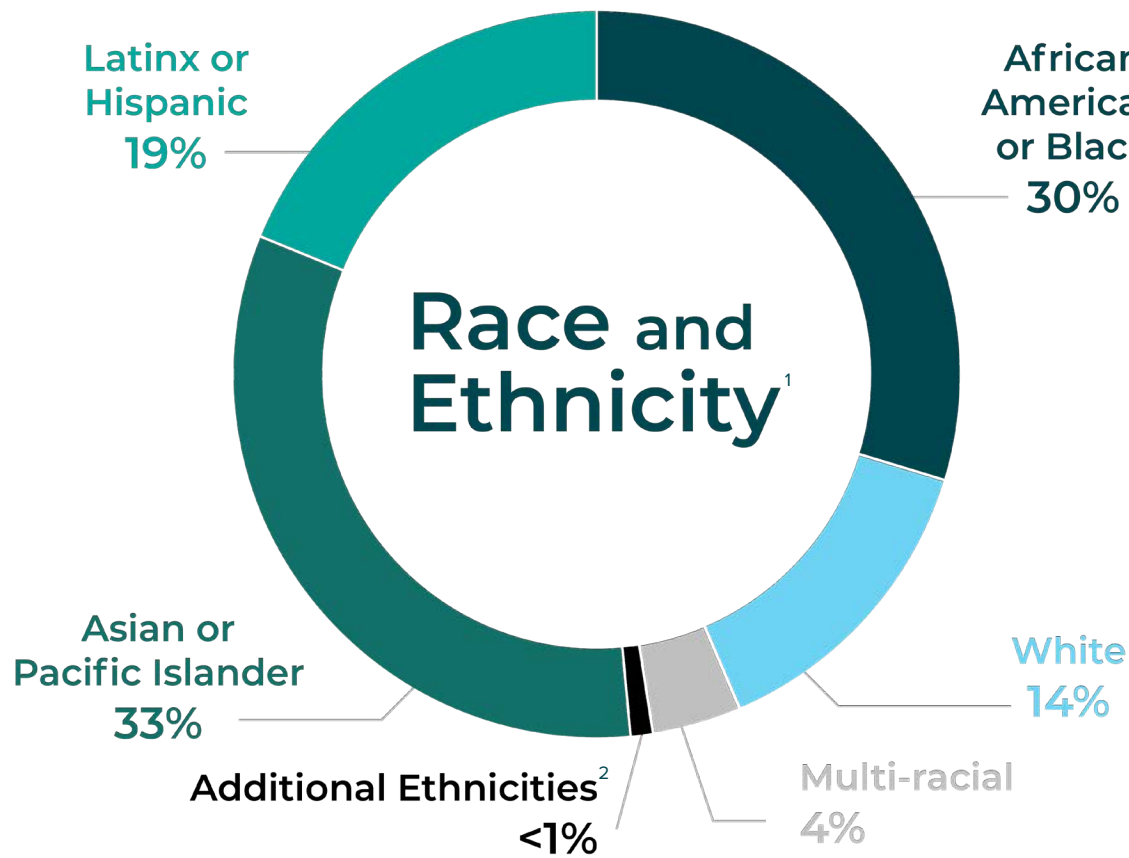

In her own words: An interview with Wallin alumna Jasmine Omorogbe

From North Minneapolis to Harvard and back, Jasmine is now paying it forward to future generations.

Jasmine, thank you for joining us. Let's talk a little bit about college and how Wallin was able to help you.

I grew up in North Minneapolis and attended Patrick Henry High School. The U of M Twin Cities was a very different environment than I was used to. There were fewer faces that looked like mine. The campus was huge and there were many acronyms to learn! Wallin was immensely helpful throughout my collegiate journey. Thankfully, with assistance from Wallin and other programs, I was able to graduate without any student loan debt. That fact played a major role in my decision to attend graduate school, which ultimately helped to accelerate my career and personal life in many ways. Also, the support I received from my Wallin advisor and peer scholars was amazing. I am still friends with many of them to this day.

That's great to hear. Tell us a little bit about your journey after college.

Working in various offices across campus as an undergraduate student cultivated my



love for higher education. After graduating from the U, I went on to work in admissions and student affairs there, helping students to walk the same path that I had just completed. Having found joy in that, I proceeded further down that path by studying higher education administration at the Harvard Graduate School of Education. While there, I found an

incredible network. The entire experience was undoubtedly transformative.

Tell us about the work that you're doing now.

After Harvard, I continued working in higher education. I was (and still am) passionate about the success of students from underrepresented backgrounds as they get to and through college. I recently transitioned into the tech space and today I work with universities to enhance their technology to better support their students. I also have a career consulting business where I utilize industry best practices to aid individuals in achieving their professional goals.

Amazing. We had 80 scholars and alumni join us for our career prep event this September. You were kind enough to help host and provide your expertise. Tell us about that experience and how it felt to give back.

Seeing things come full circle in that way was truly rewarding. I could identify with where

students were in the process. I flashed back to myself being nervous when applying for jobs. Even so, many people freely gave of their time and talent to assist me and it felt great to be able to give back, even in a small way, toward the amazing efforts of the Wallin team.

What advice would you give to current Wallin scholars?

Say “yes” to new opportunities. Sometimes, you may be unsure if you are worthy. You are worthy! Know that it’s not all about the destination, the journey is the fun part. Without trying new things, you never know who you may meet, what you may see, or the ways that those opportunities can remarkably change your path for the better!

Lastly, is there anything you would like to say to our donors and partners who make Wallin’s program possible?

Career exploration and discernment is an important phase for our scholars as they begin their college and career journey. We guide scholars as they discover and pursue their career.



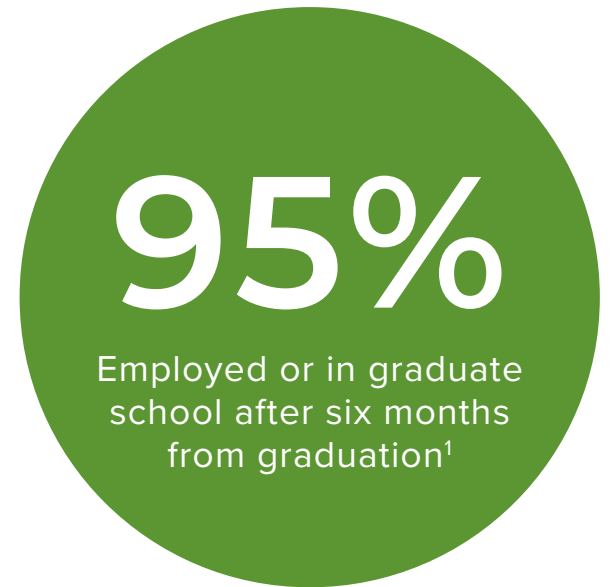

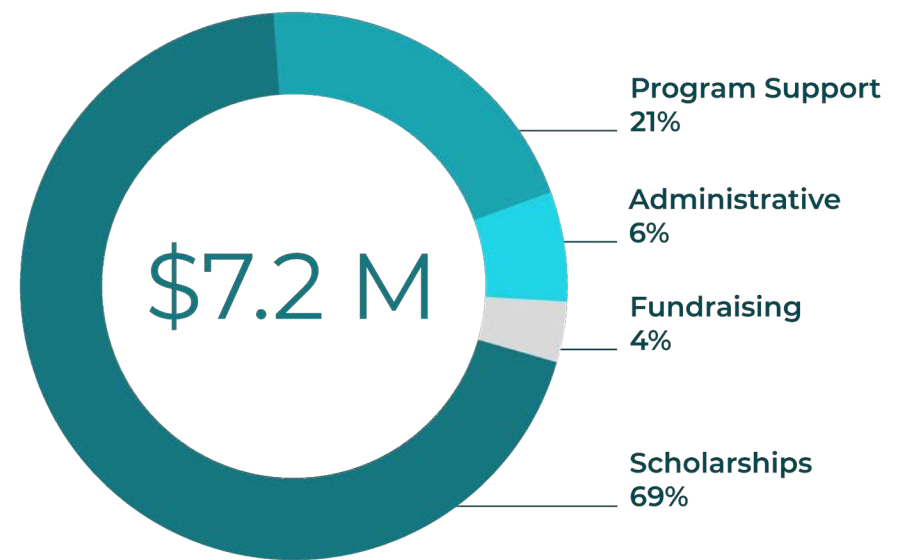
